### INSURANCE FOR COLLEGE STUDENTS

On October 9, 2008 then President Bush signed Public Law 110-381. It amended the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, the Public Health Service Act, and the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to ensure that dependent students who take a medically necessary leave of absence do not lose health insurance coverage, and for other purposes.

As I was doing further research on this, I found New York State already had a similar law, Insurance Law S. 3237, effective April 1, 2000.

#### The text reads:

Health Insurance Coverage for full-time students on medical leaves of absence.

(a) Every individual's health insurance policy and every group or blanket accident or health insurance policy that provides coverage for dependent children who are full-time students to a higher age than other dependent children shall continue the coverage of a covered dependent student who takes a leave of absence from school due to illness for a period of twelve months from the last day of attendance in school, provided, however, that nothing in this section shall require coverage of a dependent student beyond the age at which coverage would otherwise terminate.

- (b) In order to qualify under this section, the medical necessity of a leave of absence from school must be certified to by the student's attending physician who is licensed to practice in the state of New York. Written documentation of the illness must be submitted to the insurer.
- (c) The rate charged for such extended coverage shall be the same as that charged while the dependent is enrolled as a full-time student.

"Human Rights. Yes!" is a human rights training manual developed for people with disabilities and their representative organizations. This publication explains the meaning of the rights enshrined in the Convention, provides guidance on self-advocacy tactics, and how to take a human rights approach to disability rights whether at the community or national level. It is an important resource for all individuals or organizations wanting to incorporate a human rights approach to disability into their work, including human rights groups focused on children and women.

#### FREE LIBRARY SERVICES FOR THE BLIND, VISUALLY IMPAIRED, AND DISABLED

New York State Talking Book and Braille Library (TBBL), coordinates with the nation-wide program by the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, a division of the Library of Congress.

To be eligible for books and magazines on cassette, and a special cassette player, NYS

residents must have a visual or other physical limitation which prevents reading printed materials, or holding a book, or turning its pages. Those who have a reading disability, such as dyslexia, are also eligible for this free service. Borrowers may live independently, or in an institution such as developmental centers, nursing homes, or other health related facilities, or attend school. This TTBL program is for the school-aged through adult.

CSD-DTV Help Center for Individuals who are deaf, hard of hearing and deaf blind is open 7:00 AM to 1:00 AM (CST) 7 days a week.

The FCC (Federal Communications Commission) is working with community-based organizations to help educate consumers, assist with converter box procurement and installation, establish and staff help centers and conduct post- deadline assistance with respect to the transition to digital television (DTV).

The CSD-DTV Help Center is tailored to meet the communication needs of 28 million deaf, deaf-blind, hard of hearing, and speech-disabled consumers seeking information related to the DTV transition, assistance with coupon and converter box procurement, installation and post-deadline assistance across the country.

The CDS-DTV Help Center will communicate with individuals, one to one, and their families to educate them about the DTV change and troubleshoot issues as needed to ensure a converter box is successfully obtained and installed.

Consumers who are deaf or hard of hearing will be offered a choice of communication modes that matches their needs whether it is by voice, videophone, TTY, Instant Messaging, IP Relay, Voice Carry-Over Relay, Captioned Telephone, Video Relay and Spanish Video Relay.

With this FREE service, you will be able to...

- Search properties for FREE with a tollfree phone call or via the Internet.
- See listings described in detail with pictures, maps, and information about nearby amenities. Landlords willing to modify units for accessibility needs are noted.
- View current vacancies and access lottery information and active waitlists.
- Rely upon trained call center staff to assist in locating listings.
- Search for housing by geographic area, type of housing needed, price, and accessible features.

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# Special Report: Economic Recovery Bill Provides Social Security with Resources to Help Americans

On February 17, 2009, President Obama signed into law the *American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009*. Among its provisions are one-time payments to Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) beneficiaries, as well as funding to help the agency address critical needs.

### One-Time Payments of \$250 For Social Security and SSI Beneficiaries

Nearly 55 million people who receive Social Security and SSI benefits will get a special one-time payment of \$250. They should receive the one-time payment by late May 2009.

The payments will be automatic, so people receiving benefits do not need to take any action.

People who receive both Social Security and SSI benefits will receive only one payment of \$250. The legislation also provides for a one-time payment to recipients of Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and Railroad Retirement Board (RRB) benefits. However, if a person receives Social Security or SSI benefits and also receives VA or RRB benefits, he or she will only receive one \$250 payment. Social Security will send that payment.

In April, Social Security (SSA) will send an advance notice with further information to each person who is eligible for the one-time payment.

So that SSA can issue the payments as quickly as possible, they ask that people not contact them unless their payment is not received by June 4, 2009.

#### U.S. LABOR DEPARTMENT TO BEGIN NEW MONTHLY DATA SERIES ON PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

On February 6, the U.S. Department of Labor started releasing employment and unemployment data on people with disabilities. This information will assist the nation in understanding how changing labor market conditions affect Americans with disabilities. Although it is widely believed that this group faces a higher rate of unemployment than individuals without disabilities, official estimates were not available until now.

"Now that so many Americans are suffering job losses, there is a tremendous amount of attention being paid to employment problems and solutions affecting the general population. Americans with disabilities typically experience similar employment difficulties- even when there is a robust economy. The economic downturn may just exacerbate their struggle. These data will go far toward efforts to increase the employment of people with disabilities," said John Davey, deputy assistant secretary for the department's Office of Disability Employment Policy (ODEP).

ODEP is sponsoring the collection of these data by the department's Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) using the Current Population Survey (CPS), which provides comprehensive information of the employment status of the civilian, non-institutional population 16 years of age and older. Six disability questions have been added to the CPS to satisfy a requirement specified in Executive Order 13078, signed by President Bill Clinton, to measure the employment status of people with disabilities on a timely basis.

On February 6, the BLS and the ODEP started publishing on their web sites-at www.bls.gov/cps./cpsdisability.htm and www.dol.gov/odep respectively- data on

individuals with disabilities. The data will be updated monthly.

ODEP is leading a 21st century federal response to the historic underemployment of people with disabilities. In collaboration with other government agencies, public and private employers, and additional stakeholders, ODEP development facilitates the implementation of innovative policies and practices necessary to achieve a fully inclusive workforce. ODEP's work falls into three categories: employers and the workplace; workforce systems; and employment-related supports, which include education and training, health care, reliable transportation, affordable housing and assistive technology.

## NEW YORK PRESCRIPTION SAVER CARD

The application for the **New York Prescription Saver (NYPS) Card** is now available. It is located at the following link: http://nyprescriptionsaver. fhsc.com.

This is a discount card (it is not insurance), administered by the EPIC program for the following individuals:

- New York residents aged 50 to 64, OR people under 50 years old and who have been determined disabled by the Social Security Administration; AND
- have annual household income less than \$35,000 (single) or \$50,000 (married); AND
- are not on Medicaid (including Medicaid spend-down or Medicaid Buy-In for Working People with Disabilities).

Savings will vary depending on the quantity, type and brand of drug purchased. In general, you can expect savings up to 60% off the price of generics, and up to 30% off the price of brand name drugs. You cannot use the card when Medicare Part D pays for a particular prescription drug, although you can use the card in the "donut hole" or for excluded drugs. The card will also be useful for people with disabilities who are in the 2-year waiting period for Medicare. ## FACING DEATH, A PLEA FOR THE DIGNITY OF PSYCHIATRIC PATIENTS

NYAPRS Note: Here's a very powerful statement by one of our greatest leaders, Judi Chamberlin, from the Boston area hospice where she is living and receiving care for chronic obstructive pulmonary disease. Chamberlin was hospitalized against her will for depression in 1966, and was shocked by how she was treated. Her seminal book, "On Our Own: Patient-Controlled Alternatives to the Mental Health System," came out in 1978, and became a manifesto for the movement. Chamberlin's activism for patients' rights spanned the next 31 years, and evolved with the history of mental health treatment in this country.
